
New Student Opportunities

"We have four current students competitively fishing at this time," Cammack shared. "MCHS teammates, Nathaniel Trueblood and Grady Field will compete in the high school state tournament while MJHS teammates, Carson Cammack and Ayden Liter, will compete in the junior high state tournament both held in April.

The team, currently sitting at 10-12 anglers, is seeking Boat Captains - adults with access to 16' fishing vessels to volunteer with team members. "There have to be three people in each vessel at all times," Cammack stated. "I have already had several individuals reach out willing to help. From boats to instruction on skill enhancement, to sponsorships - people are excited to see this opportunity for our kids!"

Weather Tower


As part of our ongoing commitment to safety, there is a new weather station tower located between the campuses of MCHS and MJHS.

Just in time for our Spring sports season, the tower will serve multiple purposes. Located in the high school parking lot on the roof of the Engineering Lab, the tower will detect and alert for weather, specifically lightning. "One of the things we are always working on is improved safety for our students, athletes, and visitors," shared Patric Morrison, Madison AD. "With the addition of the weather station, we are able to be better alerted to lightening, monitor wet bulb temperature - which is key for summer training and outdoor events, and bring a tight radar view as we prepare for and host outdoor events."

If you are within the vicinity of the tower and there is a lightning strike within 10 miles of the weather station a siren will sound and a strobe light will flash. The strobe will continue to flash for the 30minute recommended duration of time. Once everything is clear and there is no lightning detected within the 30-minute timeframe, the siren will sound again for 3 short horn blasts which indicate the allclear. If lightning strikes again within 30 minutes, the strobe will continue to flash. "This is one more step to help reduce the risk of weather-related dangers," Morrison continued. "We hope this addition provides everyone on our campuses and our adjoining neighbors assurance that we are doing all we can to prioritize everyone's safety." You may notice this as an option on your weather apps downloaded to your phone.


The lightning detector is currently active Monday - Friday from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. and Saturday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The monitoring window will be evaluated and changed as necessary to fit the various schedules across both campuses.


