MJHS Students Partner with Renowned Sculptor Dale Rogers on Project

As part of the Sunrise Crossing development, MCS has established a partnership with property developer CRM Companies, working with Kim Nyberg of the Madison Area Arts Alliance and Tony Steinhardt from the City of Madison, to create a hands-on, creative learning experience that will build upon existing academic standards and layer them with a creative vibe and opportunity to craft and share stories visually through artistic expression.

"We are thrilled for our students to work with renowned sculptor Dale Rogers/Dale Rogers Studios on this project," shared Eric Phagan, local artist, and MJHS Art teacher. "This is one of those once-in-a-lifetime experiences that will plant a seed that grows from class to class." Mr. Rogers met with students over a three-day period in March and shared stories about his creative process, techniques for working with different materials, and helped students think about how they can adapt their learning to their classroom, skill level, and scope of the project.

The work began with MJHS students developing their points of view for complementary pieces. Inspiration came from their annual walking field trip through historic downtown Madison in early April. Students visited numerous sites along the way and were tasked with capturing ideas that could be turned into a sculpture that would complement "Bird Man". Then we thought, why not make it a contest? Twenty students entered their drawings into a juried contest, made a presentation with slides to a room full of people to sell their project, and in the end, eleven pieces were selected to move on to production with MCHS Cub Industries.

"My vision for this project is to bring community art, creative educational partners, and students working together between our campuses to produce (potentially) numerous pieces of various sizes and scope that capture the history of our entire community eventually weaving together locations throughout our county," Phagan continued. Winning selections will go to production in August for a late fall installation schedule.


